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Performing Portuguese, Becoming Betawi

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ABSTRACT

The Keroncona Tuau of Indonesia traced its origin to the Tugu "Portuguese" Village in North Jakarta. Based on ethnographic fieldwork, this article examines the interplay of the Tugu people's identification with the Portuguese as well as with the Betawis indigenous population of Jakarta, by focusing on their material culture and entertainments, as well as the recent development of Portugal-Indonesia relations. "cultural concept account the into performance", this article demonstrates that paving attention to the apparel used by the Keroncong Tuqu musicians and the interactions among Tugu people during their festivals can reveal to us that Keroncong Tugu is not only a marker of Tugu identity but it also challenges us to redefine the Tuqu people as well as the Betawis in the multi-ethnic context of Jakarta. This provides a broader perspective for understanding the interaction between identity and intercultural relations in postcolonial societies.
